Tasiujaq means "which looks like a lake" in Inuktitut, because it is located at the end of a small bay.



History

Tasiujaq has been an Inuit village since 1966, when inhabitants of Kuujjuaq decided to settle in regions known by their ancestors and that favor traditional activities, especially due to large wildlife resources. Located 110 km north-east of Kuujjuaq (and 1560 km north of Montreal), Tasiujaq is at the mouth of Leaf river, in a lake of the same name that communicates with Ungava bay. It is also the geographical limit where shrub tundra ends and arctic tundra starts: trees are scarce.

Access




Tasiujaq can be reached by plane by taking a Canadian North flight from Montreal/Quebec to Kuujjuaq then an Air Inuit flight from Kuujjuaq to Tasiujaq.

You will be staying in a transit 30 m away from the clinic. There are two private bedrooms; the rest is shared. During the pandemic, you will be staying at the hotel during the 14-day isolation period, unless the transit is empty.



Smoking in the transit and bringing your spouse is forbidden.
Animals are not allowed.



The transit is equipped. TV is included, but there is no access to the Internet (you can buy a modem in the community) and long-distance calls are not possible with the transit phone.





Activities and attractions

Sea kayaking during summer


